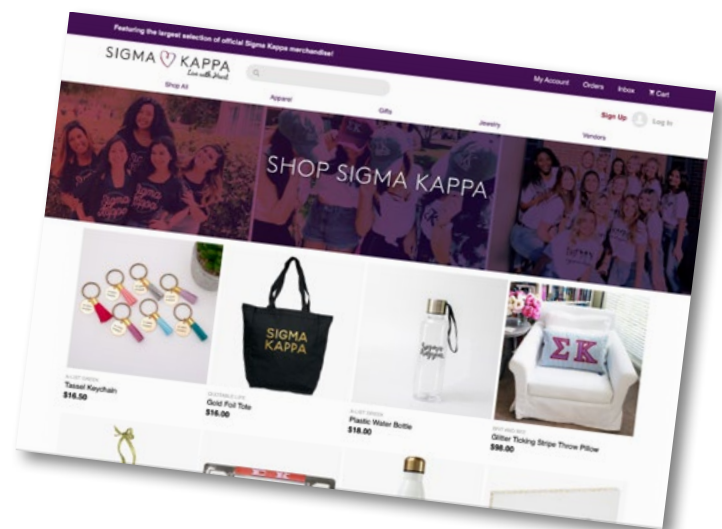

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DISTRICT CAUCUS



The district caucuses will take place on **Thursday, June 18** from 8:30-9:30 p.m. ET.

In Sigma Kappa, caucuses are used to select the nominating committee members for the next biennium. There is a caucus for each district and a caucus for all past national council members, to select the chairman. Voting delegates in each district will elect the members and alternates for the 2020-2022 nominating committee. The nominating committee will slate the 2022-2024 national council. Additional information on the caucuses can be found in the Caucus Guide.

A district member and one (1) alternate shall be elected during a caucus of each district. The nominee with the highest number of votes shall be elected the district representative and the nominee with the second highest number of votes shall be elected the alternate.

Delegates representing collegiate and alumnae chapters (including advisory board and corporation board delegates) shall attend the caucus of the district in which their chapter is located. Other members and delegates shall attend the caucus of the district in which they reside. All former national council members shall attend the caucus of past national council members.

The collegiate district director and the alumnae district director shall jointly chair their respective district caucus. The collegiate district director and the alumnae district director shall vote should they meet the eligibility requirements, but shall not have a voice. Should a director be absent, the nominating committee chairman shall appoint her replacement from the same district.

Voting privilege in the district caucus shall be extended to those eligible to vote at convention.

The chairman of the nominating committee, and one (1) alternate, shall be elected during a caucus of former national council members. The past national presidents' committee chairman or designee shall chair this caucus.



DISTRICT CAUCUS

Bylaws Reference Article VI. Section 2.c.

District caucus rules

1. The district caucuses will be held simultaneously prior to the business meeting. Members who are eligible to serve as delegates under Bylaw VIII.7.a. must register in order to vote.
2. Registered delegates will receive a confirmation email listing the times of the meetings, the Zoom information (including telephone connection), and a link to the rules and program.
3. Delegates must log in to the meeting and caucus at the appropriate times and identify themselves by listing their full name and chapter of initiation either in the chat or in their Zoom identification.
4. The Alumnae District Director and Collegiate District Director (or designated replacement) will open the meeting with the information from the Bylaws regarding the election of the nominating committee members.
5. Eligible candidates will be introduced in alphabetical order. Each candidate will have two minutes to present her statement. If a candidate cannot attend, her statement will be read by the chairman.
6. Delegates will then vote on the candidates via the polling mechanism in Zoom.
7. The appointed tellers and a member of national headquarters staff will have simultaneous access to vote totals and will announce the district committee member and alternate once the election period is concluded.
8. Election shall be plurality vote. Illegal and blank ballots shall not be counted. The member with the highest number of votes shall be the district's representative to the nominating committee; the member with the second highest number of votes shall be the alternate. In the event of a tie vote, ballots shall be recast. Only those members included in the tie vote shall be eligible for election as the representative or alternate. Ballots cast for any other member shall be considered illegal ballots and shall not be counted.

BUSINESS MEETING



The business meeting will take place on **Saturday, June 20** at noon ET.

In the business meeting, voting delegates will elect the 2020-2022 national council. The Sigma Kappa Foundation board of trustees and NHC board of directors will be announced as will the 2020-2022 nominating committee. We will also reveal the location of the 2022 national convention!

Although several proposed amendments were distributed to convention delegates in March 2020, national council and the bylaws committee, as the proposers of the amendments, have withdrawn them from consideration at this convention. The proposals related to the NPC delegate have been deemed editorial and those changes will be made by the bylaws committee. The other amendments will be proposed again for the 2022 convention.

Formal Business Meeting Rules

1. Members who are eligible to serve as delegates under Bylaw VIII.7.a. must register in order to vote.
2. Registered delegates will receive a confirmation email listing the times of the meetings, the Zoom information (including telephone connection), and a link to the rules and program.
3. Delegates must log in to the meeting and caucus at the appropriate times and identify themselves by listing their full name and chapter of initiation either in the chat or in their Zoom identification.
4. Sigma Kappa non-delegate visitors may watch the business meeting via the live-streaming but may not register.
5. The presence of a quorum shall be established at the beginning of the meeting.
6. Each member is responsible for her audio and Internet connection. No action of the convention body shall be invalidated on the grounds that a member's individual connection prevented her participation.
7. A member wishing to speak shall signal in the online meeting chat that she wishes to speak, wait to be recognized by the president, then state her name, chapter, and delegate role before proceeding.
8. A member may speak no more than two minutes per question.
9. No member shall speak more than twice to a question without permission of the convention body, the second opportunity being granted after others desiring the floor for the first time have spoken.
10. Debate on each proposed bylaw amendment or resolution shall be limited to fifteen minutes total time, inclusive of points of order, parliamentary inquiries, and requests for information.
11. While a vote is being taken, no one may enter or leave the meeting.
12. Votes (including 2/3 votes) shall be taken using the anonymous polling feature in Zoom or by a vote of the raised hands reaction feature in Zoom. Business may be conducted by unanimous consent as well.
13. Motions shall be displayed by shared power point screen as needed.
14. Minor changes of wording or punctuation are regarded as editorial changes and do not need to be acted upon by the convention body.
15. The chairman shall be displayed throughout the meeting and any member currently recognized to speak will also be displayed.

Dr. Margaret Hawkins Hill
***Lambda*, University of California, Berkeley**

Margaret is an educator, literacy advocate and volunteer who has made service and leadership an integral part of her life. As a professional educator with a doctorate and a certified diagnostician, Margaret chaired the university department in language and literacy and led her university to increase professional teachers through guidance of many national boards and standards. She also directed the reading clinic which helped autistic and dyslexic children. International literacy has been Margaret's life-long work with the implementation of border literacy conferences along the Texas/Mexico border, teaching in Guadalajara, Mexico, and international research around the globe. She has been involved with the League of Women Voters for more than 50 years at both state and national levels,

volunteered with a seven-county program for quality early childhood education, served as an expert writer for Texas English and Reading Standards, and directed community literacy projects in youth jails and county welfare agencies. Adding to her long list of involvement, she has also held leadership positions with National Federation of Garden Clubs, Daughters of the American Revolution, and multiple professional honor societies.

Sonja Hogg graduated from Louisiana Tech University with a Bachelor of Science degree in 1968 and a master of science degree in 1973. After graduation, she was a physical education teacher and head women's basketball coach at Louisiana Tech. She built the Lady Techsters from scratch to a national powerhouse that included six consecutive Final Four appearances and two national titles. In 1994, Sonja returned to college coaching to take over a floundering Baylor basketball program. After six years at the helm, she led Baylor to its first post-season appearance in 17 years. She retired from Baylor University this year after serving for the past 20 years in the Office of Development. In 2004, Sonja Hogg received the Naismith Women's Outstanding Contribution to Basketball Award. In 2009,

Sonja was elected to the Woman's Basketball Hall of Fame in Knoxville, Tennessee and she has the honor of being only the second female coach inducted into the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame in Natchitoches, Louisiana.
